

Biography

Mr Ian Cooksey was born in Sutton Coldfield in 1974. He attended Queen Mary's Grammar School and then went on to study Biological Sciences at Magdalen College, Oxford where he gained an MA in Biological Sciences and a PGCE in Science Education. More recently, he achieved an MA in School Effectiveness and School Improvement and a National Professional Qualification for Headship from the Institute of Education, University of London. He started his teaching career in 1998 at Tiffin Boys School in Kingston and rose through the ranks to become an Assistant Head at the school in 2003. In 2007, Mr Cooksey was appointed Vice Principal at Tomlinscote School (Surrey), and was later seconded as Head of College to Kings International College (Surrey). He was appointed Head of Dr Challoner's High School in 2011. Mr Cooksey enjoys travelling, mountaineering, opera and classical music. He is married and has two children

English Block Extension

During the summer work began on the extension of the English block.

Three new English classrooms (E7-E9) are now complete and they look superb. They are in full use, three weeks ahead of schedule. Final works to refurbish and cover the external stairs will be completed in the October half term.







Parental Contributions

The English block extension was funded by monthly parental contributions to the School's charity the Watford Fuller Foundation. These monthly contributions are key in supporting capital projects such as this and also in supporting the School's day-to-day running costs.

Over the next three years the government is reducing the grant to our School by 1.5%. The School currently receives a grant of around £7 million so our School will see a reduction of at least £105,000 per annum over the next three years meaning that our wider deficit is now predicted to be around £500,000 in three years time.



Thai Marinated Chicken

Thai Marinated Chicken

For 4 people

- Ingredients
- 4 chicken breasts 4 cloves of garlic finely chopped 1 teaspoon of black pepper 1 teaspoon of coriander 2 tablespoons of soy sauce 1 tablespoon of oil 1 tablespoon of honey 1 large pinch of salt

Method

Score the chicken pieces so that they will absorb the marinade sauce. Mix all the other ingredients together and add to the chicken. Leave for 1-2 hours then put on a barbecue, under a medium grill or in a moderate oven at gas mark 4 or 180 degrees Celsius until the chicken is cooked through.

Film night review

On the 28th of June, I, along with a number of others, attended the film night at Watford Boys. As a huge movie fan, and particularly a fan of *Back to the Future*, it was fantastic to be able to see the film on a big screen with an audience, just like it would have been 20 years ago in 1985 when it was first released. We were also given the opportunity to see a short film made by young people in Watford, *Surviving*.

We arrived to a warm reception of snacks and the obligatory popcorn and first settled down to watch the short film, about young people surviving through a zombie attack. The film was made with the support of the company FilmBox, and I was immediately impressed with its production value. Dark and gloomy cinematography was utilised well to reflect the mood and special effects were surprisingly believable for such a low budget production. It was played well by the group of teenagers, some of whom were also behind the camera. All in all the film was concise and impressively well put together. It served as a very good warm up to the main feature.

Although I have seen *Back to the Future* several times before, it's always a treat to revisit such a classic of 80s entertainment. There's not much to say that hasn't already been said hundreds of times before, but the film deserves all the praise it gets. It's the epitome of what 'blockbuster' should mean. There's little finesse to it but there really doesn't need to be. It's thrilling and compelling fun.

If you look closely it's true that there may be small plot holes, as is true with absolutely any movie involving time travel, but rewatching it, one thing that really stood out was just how tightly and cleverly it was scripted. It's directed by Robert Zemeckis, who has proved himself to be a master storyteller with other films such as *Forrest Gump, Who Framed Roger Rabbit* and *Cast Away*. It's been fifteen years since we've had such a universally praised film from him as those, but he's coming out with *The Walk* this year, which looks very promising and could be a return to form.

Overall, the movie night was a big success, at least from my viewpoint. As a film fan, I often imagine what it would have been like to see some of my favourite films at the cinema when they were first released, and there really should be more events like this that provide an opportunity to see classics on the big screen, as well as showcasing new, local talent. I'm sure that I, along with many of the others that attended, hope that it will happen again.
